Help People Learn Minecraft

For these writing prompts, imagine somebody who has never played Minecraft. What kinds of things will they need to learn?

Help Friends Learn a New Mode

If you have friends who play Minecraft but they don't know about all the different modes, help them learn about it. Choose one mode that you know something about and then tell us about it. (Example: Creative mode, survival mode, adventure mode, multiplayer).

Convince Your Parents to Let You Play
Imagine someone has told you that they don't want you to play Minecraft. It could be a friend, a teacher, or a parent or guardian. In this two-session project, you'll write a letter changing their mind!
Session 1: Prewrite
Now, imagine all the reasons this person might not want you to play Minecraft. List five of them here:

Session 2: Write the letter

Use the prewrite to draft a short letter to the person who might not want to let you play Minecraft. Start with a greeting. Next, write one sentence explaining what you want them to do. Next, write one sentence that shows you understand their concern, and one sentence that addresses the concern. Next, write three sentences giving your reasons that Minecraft is good for you. End the letter with a salutation.

Minecraft Adventure Story

For the next 4 sessions, you will be working on a Minecraft adventure story. Each session, do a little prewrite, and then turn the page and start writing. Write 5-10 sentences each session. This session, ONLY do character and setting.

Character and Setting

Now, use the prewrite to write the beginning of the story

Write about Trouble

This is the second session of writing a Minecraft adventure story. Last session, we started planning our characters and setting and started writing the story. This session, we'll get the characters into some trouble.

Start by looking over last session's prompt to remind yourself about what you were doing. Next, brainstorm three ideas about what kinds of trouble the characters could get into.

(By the way, if you missed last session, don't do this one yet! Ask for last session's prompt and work on that instead).

Now, pick one of the kinds of trouble and start writing! Use up the whole page if you can, but write at least 5 sentences.

Even more trouble:

This is the third session of writing a Minecraft adventure story. There is a common pattern to many adventure stories: something bad happens, and the character tries THREE times to get out of trouble. Everything gets worse and worse until the last attempt, which might succeed (happy ending!) or fail (bad ending!).

Last session, we got the characters into some trouble. This session, the characters will try two things to get out of trouble. Next session, we'll end the story.

Start by looking over your story so far. Then do the prewrite, and start writing! Use the whole page if you can, but write at least 5 sentences. Have fun!

Write the Middle

Now, use the prewrite to tell about what went wrong. Write at least 5 sentences.

Write the Ending

This is the last session of writing a Minecraft adventure story. It's time to get to the ending! Last session, the characters tried two things to get out of trouble. This time, they'll try a third thing, and it will either succeed (happy ending!) or fail (bad ending!).

By the way, after the last attempt succeeds or fails, the story is almost done, but not quite. Stories usually take a minute to let the reader wind down. So make sure to include a one-sentence wrap-up at the end. There's no right or wrong way to end a story -- just think about what you can add to make it "feel" finished.
